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## Nobel prize winners call for urgent 'moonshot' effort to avert global hunger

In January, over 150 Nobel and World Food Prize laureates signed an open letter urging immediate, large-scale efforts to prevent a global hunger crisis. They advocate for a "moonshot" initiative to significantly increase food production, emphasizing the need for innovative solutions and international collaboration. The letter highlights the urgency of addressing food insecurity exacerbated by climate change, conflicts, and economic instability. The signatories call on governments, private sectors, and civil society to prioritize sustainable agricultural practices, invest in research and development, and implement policies that ensure equitable food distribution to avert impending famine conditions.



# UN launches \$6 billion Sudan appeal, as famine takes hold

The UN has warned of an escalating humanitarian catastrophe in Sudan, where ongoing conflict has displaced 12 million people and created the world's largest hunger crisis. Famine has been confirmed in 10 locations, with 17 more on the brink. UN officials condemned both warring factions for prioritizing military gains over humanitarian needs, while widespread sexual violence and forced recruitment persist. Aid organizations struggle with access constraints, inflation, and funding shortages. Despite reaching 15.6 million people in 2024, relief efforts remain insufficient. The UN calls for increased international support, urgent funding, and diplomatic action to prevent further devastation and famine.

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### Who else can help with lowering global food insecurity rates?

Addressing issues like global food insecurity requires collaborative efforts across sectors. Food and beverage companies like Nestlé have taken their commitment to SDG 2 seriously by partnering with local communities and food banks to develop innovative food programs that support sustainability efforts. In 2023 alone, Nestlé contributed over 140 million servings of food through food banks, and their ongoing efforts also include supporting nutrition education and developing products specifically for food banks, like the Maggi Hearty One Pot Casserole. This healthy and nutritious recipe base alone has enabled 1.2 million meals yearly. U.S. partnerships with Feeding America and urban farms have also aimed to strengthen local food systems. Collective action from corporations, nonprofits, governments, and citizens is essential to alleviate hunger worldwide. Individuals can contribute by supporting these initiatives, reducing food waste, and advocating for policies that promote equitable food distribution.



## Farmers Say Climate-Smart Commodities Projects Are Crumbling

American farmers dedicated to improving land stewardship through climate-smart commodity projects are currently navigating financial hurdles due to pauses in USDA funding. These farmers have proactively invested in agricultural practices to reduce the likelihood of drought and famine: both of which have become real threats to our food system in recent years. Recent policy changes from DC, however, have caused a temporary funding freeze and contract reviews, leading to serious concerns about project continuity. Developing innovative fiscal solutions that include alternative funding partners like philanthropists, corporate entities, and venture funds will be essential to maintain momentum in these vital food security efforts and to uphold the very programs designed for the progression of American agriculture and the health of the American people. When farmers, policymakers, and private sector stakeholders work together to forge resilient, diversified funding pathways, we can foster a sustainable and secure food future for today and for generations to come.
